

Dr. Clarissa Myrick-Harris, Vice President of One World Archives, is also the National Director of the Global Issues Honors Consortium (GIHC), a partnership between the University of Minnesota, Tougaloo College and Dillard University that prepares students of color for graduate study with an emphasis on global issues. In addition she is a Distinguished Research and Teaching Fellow in the Interdisciplinary Center for the Study of Global Change at the University of Minnesota Twin Cities.

Dr. Myrick-Harris is the co-curator of the exhibit “Red Was the Midnight: The 1906 Atlanta Race Riot,” which will premiere at the Martin Luther King, Jr. National Historic Site’s Visitor Center in September 2006. She has curated several exhibits for the APEX Museum, including “Sweet Auburn: Street of Pride;” she co-authored the companion publication for that exhibit as well. More recently she curated “Blacks in Georgia Politics,” now a traveling exhibit.

She was the primary historian consultant for the web-based project “Atlanta in the Civil Rights Movement,” sponsored by the Atlanta Regional Council for Higher Education (ARCHE). In that capacity she wrote most of the historical content for the site. Dr. Myrick-Harris is a Consulting Editor for the three-volume series *The Sound of the Genuine: The Papers of Howard Thurman*. She has written about the anti-lynching crusader Ida B. Wells Barnett for *Smithsonian Magazine* and biographical essays for the 2006 editions of *Notable Black Men* and *African Americans in Business*. She is the co-author of *Black Studies 101: The Journey*, a multi-media learning tool used in several school systems in Georgia and New York.

Her essay “Behind the Scenes: Two Women of the Free Southern Theater,” is published in the edited volume *Women of the Civil Rights Movement: Trailblazers and Torchbearers*. She is currently writing a book-length manuscript entitled *Down in New Orleans: Ideology, Class and Gender in the Free Southern Theater, 1963-1978*.

Dr. Myrick-Harris was a member of the Georgia National Historic Register Review Board. From 2002-2006; she was chair of the Review Board for 2005-2006. Dr. Myrick-Harris, a native Atlantan, earned her B.A. degree from Morris Brown College, M.A. degree from The Ohio State University, and Ph.D. from Emory University. She has taught at Emory University, University of Georgia, University of Cincinnati, Morris Brown College and Clark Atlanta University.
